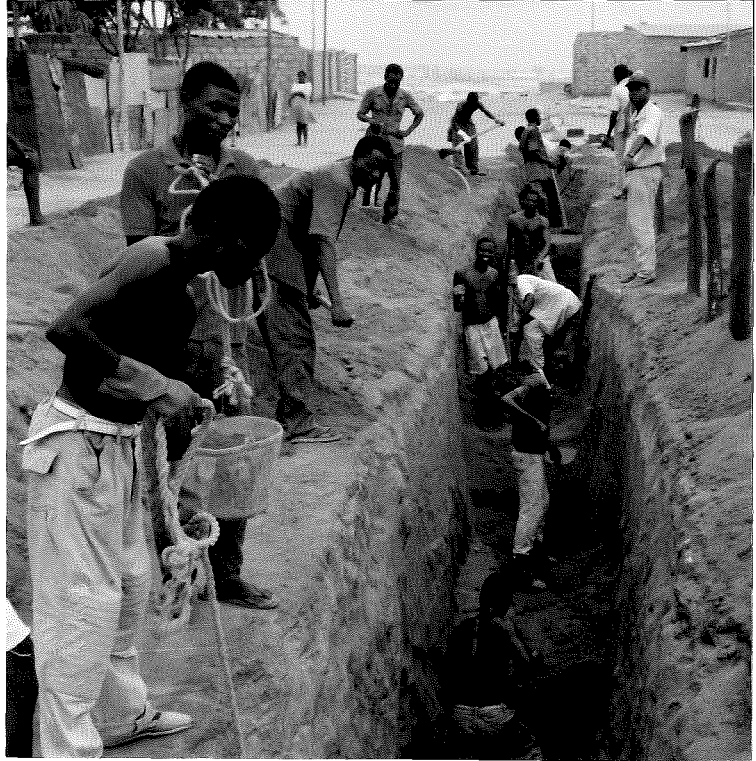

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1. Introduction

The Luanda Urban Food Bank Programme aims to improve the productivity of national Non-Governmental Organizations' (NGOs) and church-based organizations implementing small-scale development projects in peri-urban areas of Luanda by providing food rations to supplement workers' salaries. Because of the economic crisis brought on by years of civil war, household incomes rarely meet the monthly costs of living. Without supplementary assistance, project workers would be forced to spend time in search of food or in parallel income producing activities. Time and energy would be taken away from project responsibilities, thus affecting project implementation.

The forerunner of the current programme (then known as the Food for Work Programme funded by Programme Angola) began in early 1990 with three projects. The programme now supports some 50 local NGO and church-based projects with a total of approximately 900 worker recipients of food rations. The beneficiaries, i.e., those that benefit from the projects being implemented by the NGOs and church organizations are estimated at between 250-280 thousand people in the peri-urban areas of Luanda.

Development Workshop, a nonprofit agency based in Canada implements the programme. The programme's main donors are The Sharing Way and Canadian Food Grains Bank. Supplementary food, amounting to about 70 percent of the Canadian donations, has also been obtained from the United Nations World Food Programme and more recently from the European Union Food Aid Programme.

The period from 1992 to 1994 was a crucial time for NGO assistance in Angola. As the civil war spread from Luanda into most provincial towns in early 1993, government services began to collapse. National and international NGOs stepped in to provide and distribute humanitarian assistance. Major roads closed, cutting off cities from one another, and more devastatingly, from their agricultural areas. The economy declined, investment stopped, commodity prices rose, and government salaries were frozen. International NGOs with their access to foreign funds were able to continue to provide emergency assistance programmes while the resources of national NGOs quickly dried up limiting their ability to provide assistance to Angolans.

Since the peace accord in November 1994, military forces have been demobilized, UN peace keepers have started to arrive, and major inter-provincial roads have opened. There are positive signs that the 1994 peace accord will be different from that in 1992 which failed within two years of

signing. Foreign aid for infrastructure rehabilitation has been offered, petroleum prices have been realistically set, and trade may soon begin between provinces and neighbouring countries.

The economy, however, continues to be unstable. The parallel market exchange rate fell from 95,000 New Kwanzas to 800,000 New Kwanzas per one US Dollar during 1994 (the current rate is NKwz 1.5 million per one US Dollar). Inflation is now about 40 percent per month. In August 1994, a teacher or nurse earned a monthly salary of less than five U.S. dollars; at that same time, one litre of oil cost more than one dollar and one kilo of sugar cost more than five dollars. It is predicted that it will take several more years before the macroeconomic reforms can stabilize the economy.

The period 1992 to 1994 saw the rapid expansion of the Luanda Urban Food Bank Programme. The number of projects supported grew from 12 to 35: an increase of 65 percent. The programme's *raison d'être* was solidly established: to keep local NGOs functioning, the workers' minimal salary had to be subsidized, the food packages were a means of doing this.

The capacity of national NGOs has also increased. In addition to meeting immediate emergency needs, longer-term needs are being identified and projects are being designed accordingly. No longer are international NGOs the only actors at the forefront of development initiatives, the Angolan NGOs and church-based organizations have assumed key roles as well.

1.2 Structure of Report

This annual report (FY1994-1995) focuses on an evaluation of the programme conducted from April to June 1995. The evaluation was a follow-up to the 1994 interim assessment of the projects supported by the programme. The next section outlines the main findings and recommendations of the evaluation. The programme has already acted upon most of the recommendations. Changes have been made to the programme's operational procedures and systems. These changes are respectively discussed in the following sections: application procedure, food distribution system, and programme monitoring and maintenance operations.

2. Evaluation results

This section presents the objectives, methodology, main findings and recommendations of the evaluation.

2.1 Objectives

The interim assessment undertaken in 1994 examined each of the projects that were receiving support from the Luanda Urban Food Bank programme but it did not examine the delivery of the programme as a whole. As part of the ongoing effort to improve the programme's performance, an evaluation was conducted to assess overall programme implementation. The specific objectives of the evaluation were:

- to examine the effectiveness and efficiency of programme delivery by the executing organization (Development Workshop), with a particular emphasis on recommending improvements in the programme monitoring system, and
- to evaluate the appropriateness and the delivery of the individual projects receiving support from the programme.

Issues of effectiveness examined the outputs of the programme. It included the following concerns: What are the impacts and effects resulting from carrying out the programme? Does the programme have a fair and accessible system for all projects? Is the programme meeting its set objectives? And for the individual projects, were the projects meeting their targeted goals and objectives and the extent to which the project produced its expected outputs? To what extent has the purpose of the programme been achieved? How does the programme relate to the overall objectives of Development Workshop?

Issues of efficiency examined whether Development Workshop manages its operations in an efficient way. Are there adequate systems to monitor program and financial management and the implementation of individual projects? Is the programme delivered in a cost effective manner? For individual projects, efficiency was assessed in terms of how well the project implementation was managed and whether the number of workers who received food was justified.

2.2 Methodology

The evaluation had two linked phases: a) an investigation of the projects receiving food rations from the programme, and b) a study of the management of the programme. The evaluation team consisted of an external evaluation consultant and a translator.

The first phase focused on the individual projects receiving support from the programme. The projects were categorized by their sectoral focus: public health, community health, public works, education, community development, and institutional development. Because the projects covered a wide range of sectors, Development Workshop's technical staff assisted the

evaluator in setting criteria which were then used to evaluate the projects. The same criteria will be used to assess future projects that apply for assistance.

Structured questionnaires were designed for each sector. These were discussed with the Development Workshop technical staff to ensure that all pertinent issues were addressed. The questionnaires gathered both qualitative and quantitative information. The questionnaires were designed primarily to assess the delivery of the partner projects, and then to gather information about the outputs of the project. Questionnaires were pre-tested with the translator to confirm that he understood the questions that were being asked and the type of information that was sought.

Each sector was evaluated separately. Although it would have been easier to evaluate projects by geographic area, it was necessary to work in one sector at a time to establish a routine for the translator and not get him confused by the different types of questions required for different types of projects. The system worked well. After the first project visit in a given sector category, the evaluation team reviewed the questionnaire and reworked it when necessary. Depending on the sector, each visit was between 30 to 90 minutes. The information from the visits was then used to update the project database.

At the end of the evaluation, all projects received a letter stating the outcome of the evaluation and the current status of their project.

The second phase of the evaluation focused on the management systems of the programme. For some of the problems that became apparent while working with the programme, minor adjustments were made to address these during the evaluation. At the end of the evaluation, a complete management system for the programme was presented to the Development Workshop team.

2.3 Programme Delivery

The evaluation of programme delivery focused on the effectiveness and efficiency of the following systems: screening and selection of project applications, distribution of food, and monitoring of ongoing projects supported by the Food Bank.

The programme is consistent with Development Workshop's broader institutional development effort which focuses on strengthening nascent NGOs, church organizations and community based groups and linking these organizations with existing local development structures. The programme has attained its objectives for distributing food commodities received for the reporting period. In addition, it has managed to secure supplemental food

donations from two other donors: United Nations World Food Programme and the European Union Food Aid Programme.

More important than commodity management, the Luanda Urban Food Bank Programme's most valuable output has been its development of new and innovative uses of food for work. The programme is one of the few structures that exist in Luanda to strengthen the institutional development of national NGOs and church organizations. The programme typically provides the first channel for NGOs and church organizations to access external resources and manage them for development projects. It has proven to be a very good way to assist local organizations in developing their capacity during a period of economic crisis. The programme requires relatively minimal capital inputs especially when compared to the significant impact on Luanda's peri-urban communities (see section 2.4 for a further discussion on impact). Training is one area where the programme has used food for work more extensively than traditional programmes.

An overriding concern of the programme is integration with other programmes rather than being implemented as an independent programme. Through the identification of priority sectors and the development of sector-specific criteria, the programme attempts to ensure that the food commodities are used in projects that undertake broader development efforts. Effectiveness of the programme has been increased by integrating food for work with other larger activities such as those of the local health authorities.

The main findings of the management study were the following:

- Criteria necessary to assess the projects had not been clearly formulated.
- Information collected on each project was not standardized in the project data base, hence it was more difficult to consolidate data across different projects. Moreover, the data base did not allow for the easy addition of new projects.
- Programme supervision of the projects needed to be strengthened. The warehouse manager who is responsible for port clearances, transport to the warehouse, distribution to the different projects, and tracking inventory cannot at the same time be responsible for monitoring the different projects to ensure that these comply with the project agreements.
- The issue of getting the project holders to share in paying for programme operational costs needs to be further studied. A system of cost sharing between the programme and the project holders had been set up to recover the warehousing costs and to convey the notion that the food is not a dole out. Project holders are supposed to contribute 10 percent of the market value of the food received.

Collections totalled to New Kwanzas 1.234 million or about \$2,598 US dollars (based on average exchange rate of New Kwanzas 475,000 per U.S. dollar for the period FY1994-95 obtained from UNDP accounting department). This amount comes to six percent of the running costs. This, however, was based on incomplete data as not all the projects had been invoiced their share and is likely to be an underestimation of the recovered costs. The collection of the contributions, however, has proven to be a task that takes up a lot of administrative time and resources.

Recommendations:

1. Clear criteria to guide the selection of projects and to assess the performance of selected projects should be formulated.
2. Create a new computerized project database with improved information management capabilities, including standardized information for each project and easy addition of new projects.
3. Development Workshop should hire a project monitor to provide ongoing supervision to the projects and to act as a liaison between programme management and partner projects (see section 5 for specific details on the duties of the project monitor). When necessary, the Development Workshop technical team should provide assistance to the project monitor.
4. In consultation with donors and project partners, Development Workshop should review the current cost-sharing arrangements. A balance will need to be struck between finding more efficient ways of covering the programme's operational costs and instilling a sense of responsibility among project holders for the food they receive. Should the programme decide to continue the cost recovery system, improvements will be needed to be made on the collection process to lessen the administrative burden it currently imposes.
5. A revamped management system addressing the problems and limitations found in the evaluation should be developed to include procedures for screening and selection of project applications, distribution of food, and monitoring of ongoing projects.

2.4 Appropriateness and Delivery of Projects

The majority of the evaluation was spent visiting the project sites. The focus of the evaluation team was to assess how the food from the programme was being used. Therefore, the effectiveness and efficiency of partner NGOs project delivery were examined and information about the outputs was gathered.

The criteria used to assess the projects was established by the evaluator and the Development Workshop technical team (see section 3.2 for specific sectoral criteria). The information gathered from the evaluation was later used to update the project database and formed the basis of decisions on the status of the projects.

A total of 54 projects serving 977 recipients were evaluated, their breakdown by sectoral category is shown in Table 1. The project described in the boxed article illustrates the kind of community initiatives supported by the Luanda Urban Food Bank. On the whole, the majority of the projects complied with both general and sectoral criteria and, based on the evaluation findings, these projects will continue to be supported.

Some of the common problems encountered in the projects were the following:

- some projects (six out of 54) which did conform to any of the sectoral criteria were receiving food,
- some projects were receiving food for more than the registered number of project ,
- some projects provide food for occasional workers and this is not properly tracked,
- all recipients received the same quantity of food regardless of the hours worked.

Six of the 54 projects did not meet the criteria and were recommended for termination. The 48 projects that will continue to be supported in 1995/1996 have a total of 874. This will permit the programme to consider a small number of new projects for inclusion.

The programme does not have an explicit policy or general criteria requiring a certain number of projects to be targeted specifically at women but the programme's impact on women is substantial. The sectoral priorities identified by the programme are largely women's concerns. In particular, the overwhelming majority of the beneficiaries in the community health and public health projects are women. The programme generally attempts to enforce that at least 40 per cent of the recipients are women. As Table 2 shows, 31 per cent of all worker recipients are women; the programme has not yet reached this goal.

Recommendations:

1. The criteria should be clearly communicated to the project holders and should be adhered to in assessing project performance.
2. Projects should be regularly monitored to ensure compliance with submitted plans and to offer advice or when necessary.
3. The quantity of food received should be based on the number of hours worked.
4. Checks and balances need to be worked into the food distribution procedures to further ensure that the amount of food distributed matched the number of recipients. A system should also be designed to keep track of food supplied to occasional workers.

Public Health Project

The rainy seasons in Angola not only bring rain, but as well, diarrhoea related diseases. Malaria and cholera are two common diseases in Angola that flare up during the rainy season from January to May. For many Angolans, these diseases are inherent in their livelihood, yet some people living in the *musseques* of Luanda are not aware how fatal these diseases are, how they spread, how they can be cured, and what simple precautions could be taken at home to prevent them.

In 1992, Development Workshop developed a two-year public health education programme targeting high risk areas for cholera. Eight community groups were identified and trained in health and sanitation issues. The groups did home visits to test water chlorination levels and treat the water if necessary. They talked to household members about health and sanitation issues and gathered information on the kinds of latrines used by the family and the incidence of diarrhoea. The programme later expanded to include a latrine and water standpost construction element and people were trained accordingly.

As of July 1995, all these groups will no longer receive administrative or organizational assistance from Development Workshop. The groups were aware of this from the outset and had been encouraged to think about becoming self sufficient. If groups wanted to continue, they would have to develop their own system to organize themselves and their activities.

O Bairro dos Pescadores is a group of four *activistas* (community volunteers) who began with the Development Workshop cholera project. They work in a fishing village in Cacucaco, a municipality on the periphery of Luanda. The group is dynamic and seeks to continue its work without the assistance of Development Workshop. The members understand the importance of their work to the community and have organized themselves to continue their work.

Not only is the group continuing with the activities that they started with, but they have identified additional needs in the community and have networked with other organizations to provide solutions. For example, the group works with the Ministry of Social Welfare to identify orphans under 18 months and distribute food to the orphans. One member of the group has currently received training from Save the Children on dealing with "war traumatized children."

The group now acts as a liaison between the community and outside services. The bonus of having an active community group established is that it allows other organizations' projects such as those of Save the Children, UNICEF, and Christian Children's Fund to work through the activists. It is important that the group is active but it must also be able to identify community needs and network with appropriate organizations that can provide solutions.

3. Programme Screening procedures

This section outlines the application procedure and criteria that are used to screen the applications. These procedures incorporate the recommended changes based on findings of the evaluation.

3.1 Application Procedure

All projects accepted for the Urban Food Bank Programme undergo a two-step screening process involving two sets of criteria: a) the general acceptance criteria, and b) the specific sectoral criteria.

Figure 1 illustrates the application process. To qualify for programme support, an organization must accomplish the project application form. The Food Bank project officer reviews the application form to determine if it meets the general acceptance criteria. This initial screening process is based upon general conditions that establish minimum project acceptability standards (details in section 3.2). Once these projects have passed the first screening, they are then categorized by sector and judged by the Technical Team against an established set of sectoral criteria (details section 3.3). Each sector also has a quota of for the number of projects to be supported. If the project meets the sectoral criteria and the sector has not yet filled its quota, the organization is informed of acceptance within 10-14 days. A letter of agreement is then signed between the Luanda Urban Food Bank Programme and the project holder.

3.2 General Criteria for Eligibility

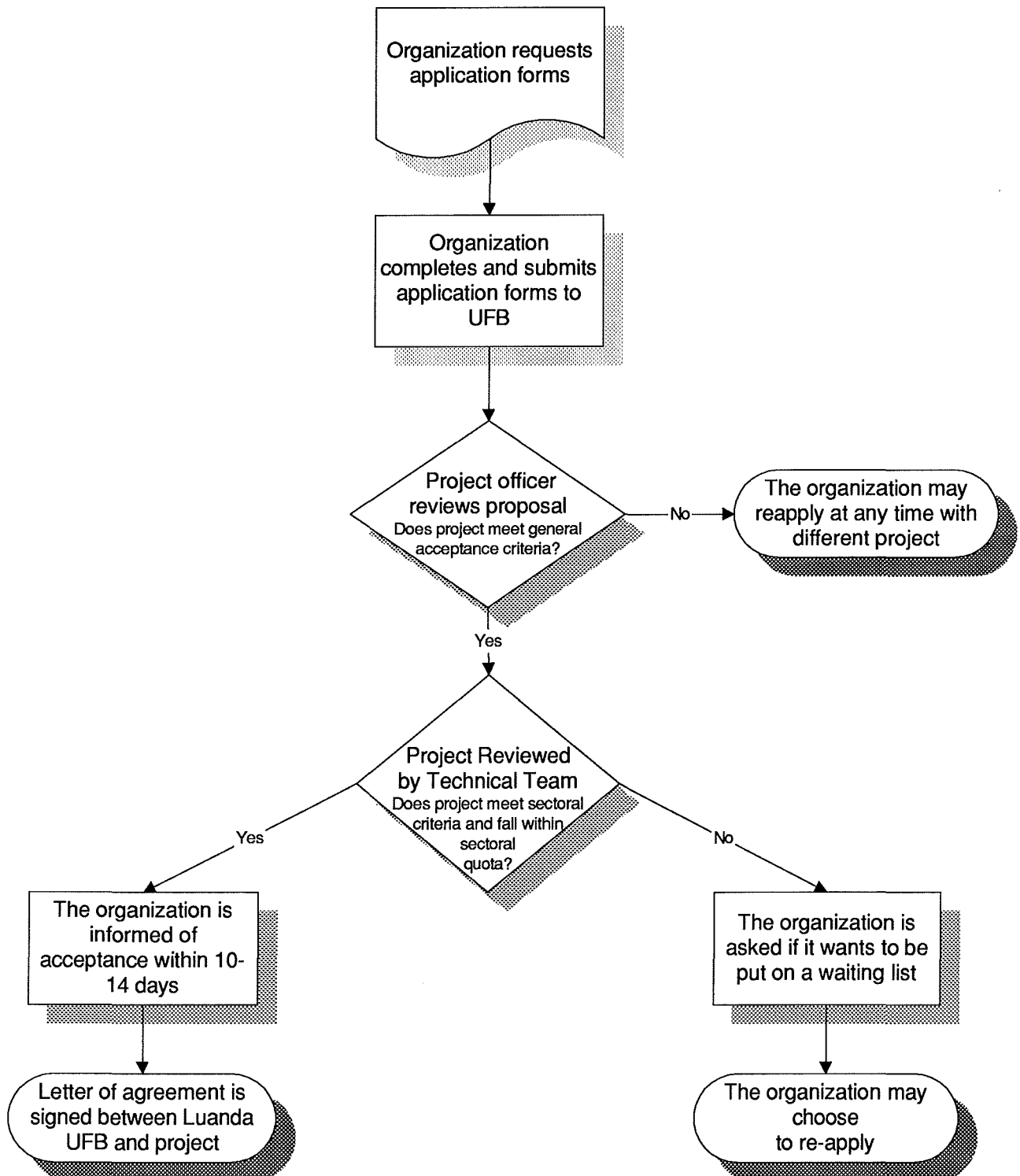
The project must meet the following criteria:

- The project must have **in place** all other necessary inputs (regardless of source).
- The project should **already be established** (i.e., a minimum of three months) with the exception of construction and civil works projects. Proposals for start-up projects are not accepted.
- The project should target a clearly recognizable need in the community.
- The implementing organization/association must be recognized: NGOs should be legal entities and community associations should be a recognizable group with common interests and/or objectives.
- In the cases of specific sectors (i.e. health, health training courses) a working agreement must exist between the project and the local authorities.

Because the food provided by the Food Bank is **supplemental**, it is imperative that projects are operational **before** they are supported by the Urban Food Bank Programme. The above set of criteria helps to guarantee that food inputs are not essential to the execution of the projects and that food inputs do not create dependency. The Urban Food Bank Programme has built in these checks to ensure that the projects supported by Development Workshop are viable in their own right.

3.3 Sectoral Criteria

The Urban Food Bank Programme supports projects that have to do with the upgrading of urban services and social infrastructure. The projects are further categorized into the following key sectors: health, education, community development, public works, and institutional development.

The following outlines the conditions of acceptance of projects within each sector:

Community Health Projects

1. A working agreement must exist between the project and the local health delegation.
2. The project must be the only approved health unit within a radius of two kilometers.
3. The project must offer Maternal and Child Care Programmes.
4. A Clinic Register must be used for each patient which includes diagnosis and treatment.
5. Each outpatient nurse must have at least an average of 10 patient contacts per working day.
6. If the clinic operates on a fee-for-service basis, fees must be an established fee for each service.
7. There must be monthly reports for each sector.

Public Health Projects

1. Work should be done by people living in the area (technical assistance may come from outside).
2. The project should have a clear link to major health problems.
3. The project should not adversely affect non-beneficiaries.
4. For community *activista* projects, house visits (which include health and sanitation promotion, water testing and treatment) are not sufficient to receive food. To be eligible, house visits must be combined with a minimum of two other activities, or one major activity and water treatment.
5. For projects doing house visits, at least 20 house visits must be made per working day.

More specific criteria could be developed for latrines, standposts, garbage, and water quality.

Education

1. Classrooms should have basic teaching materials.
2. There must be a school enrolment registration.
3. The school should have a system of evaluating the students.
4. In cases of schools for health promoters or basic nursing, the school must be approved by the Ministry of Health.

Public Works Projects

1. Project results should be clearly intended for a substantial portion of the community.
2. The project must have a social impact.
3. A termination date must be identified.
4. Where possible, food should be distributed for completed stages of work. For construction projects, an estimate of the time required to finish the project is made by the Development Workshop's engineer.

5. The project must clearly have some technical supervision provided by the local organization.

Community Development Projects

Community development projects cover a variety of areas, therefore not all criteria will apply to all projects.

1. The project must have a social impact.
2. Where possible, the direct beneficiaries of the project should be identified and registered.
3. The project must not be established as an institution.
4. The project must focus on vulnerable groups.

Institutional Support

1. The project must be clearly supporting other NGO activities. The majority of the projects supported must be of affiliated NGOs.
2. The number of projects supported must be equal to or greater than the number of people receiving Urban Food Bank support.
3. The number of beneficiaries, in terms of people affected by the projects, must be defined.

4. Food distribution system

This section describes how food is distributed to each project and within, each project, to the recipient workers. Each month, projects submit a request for food. Two forms must be included in this request: a monthly request for food form (Appendix V) and a monthly food distribution form (Appendix VI)

The Monthly Request for Food is the project's official request to the Urban Food Bank for food. On the same form, the quantity of food distributed is filled out by the Food Bank's warehouse manager. The quantity of food for each person is specified in kilograms, but the actual food is distributed by the bag or box.

The Monthly food distribution list ensures that the recipients are receiving the food. The number of names must equal the number of recipients, and upon receiving food the recipients sign the form. As well, before projects are eligible to receive the following month's food, the previous month's list must be returned with all signatures.

A system has also been set up to track food provided to occasional workers.

At the time of payment, projects must submit a monthly workplan which outlines what activities were completed in the last month (this should include numbers as well as description of activities), problems encountered, how they were solved or how they propose to solve them, and any changes planned or implemented. Depending on the activity sector, specific information may be requested from the Project Monitor (the number of

classes taught the previous month for education projects or for health, the number of consultations in each area, for example).

The warehouse manager is responsible for the monthly distribution of the food to the project.

The quantity of food the projects receive are now based on the number of hours worked. Employees must work at least 20 hours per week to receive a full ration (45 kilos of food) and anything under 20 hours per week is only eligible for 20 kilos of food per month. Full-time Angolan national employees of Development Workshop who work in Food Bank supported projects, all receive 100 kilos of food per month. Overtime hours are paid at a rate of a kilo of food per hour worked.

Appendix III is the master list which the warehouse manager uses to distribute food. The project names and number of full and half rations are all listed. This list can be updated as needed.

5. Ongoing monitoring and supervision

This section describes the monitoring and evaluation procedures for the programme.

5.1 Project Database

A new database has now been created using Lotus 1-2-3 software. The new database consists of a basic information sheet which identifies: basic background information about the project, the number of food recipients, targeted beneficiaries, a map of the area, and detailed information on the projects' purpose, activities, inputs, results, and any other additional comments from the evaluator (see Appendix I). This data sheet can be updated and new projects can be added at any time.

The filing system was improved to keep all information on current projects. All transactions and correspondence which occur between DW and the projects are kept here. The current data sheet of each project is also attached to each project file.

5.2 Monitoring and evaluation

Beyond food distribution, the ongoing maintenance of the programme involves monitoring and supervision of the projects. Project supervision is the responsibility of the **Project Monitor**. Previously, the warehouse manager was also responsible for monitoring and supervising the projects. Because the

warehouse manager did not have the time required to review the project's monthly workplans, minimal project monitoring occurred. Projects continued to receive monthly food rations regardless of the information contained in their monthly workplans. Food distribution was not always linked with the achievement of objectives or with the completion of project activities. There was a need for a better system of checks and balances for the distribution of food.

The addition of the Project Monitor to the Urban Food Bank Programme ensures that projects are accountable for the food. It also provides an interactive component to the programme. Specifically, the Project Monitor will:

- review the monthly workplans (Appendix VIII) that the projects submit to ensure that the projects are meeting Urban Food Bank Programme standards,
- visit a minimum of four projects per month,
- inform the Advisor if there are any problems, and
- liaise with local NGOs.

A Development Workshop staff member has been assigned to each sector as an **Advisor**. The advisor is responsible for a number of projects in a sector. It is the responsibility of the Advisor to provide technical, administrative and organizational assistance to the projects when necessary.

The projects receiving Food Bank support will be assessed annually. The focus of the evaluation is two-fold. First, the evaluation helps to determine the overall effectiveness and efficiency of the programme. Second, the projects of each organization receiving food commodities are evaluated to determine the impact of the projects on the communities and to assess the appropriateness of using food subsidies in each case. If projects do not meet the project performance criteria, organizations will be given a three- to six-month provisional period within which to upgrade the project. If at the end of the specified time, the project still does not meet standards, it will be terminated from the Food Bank programme. Projects may reapply, but they will not necessarily be given priority over new projects.

6. Conclusion

The Luanda Urban Food Bank Programme was conceived during a period of emergency and economic crisis. New and innovative uses of food for work have been developed through the programme. The fine tuning and development of programme procedures had somewhat lagged in the face of rapid programme expansion as the number of NGOs and church organizations requesting support increased substantially of the programme. Based on

recommendations of the evaluation, the programme management systems have been revised to address problems identified. Performance criteria to assess the projects supported have also been developed.

The conditions that gave rise to the programme will continue to exist for the next couple of years but it will be important to monitor changes in the economic situation to ensure that the the use of food subsidies continue to be appropriate and do not create a dependency. Development Workshop, along with other implementors of food aid programmes, should attempt to influence government policy on current wage levels. Providing food for work is one response to the inequitable distribution of income but it is a stop gap solution during Angola's period of emergency.

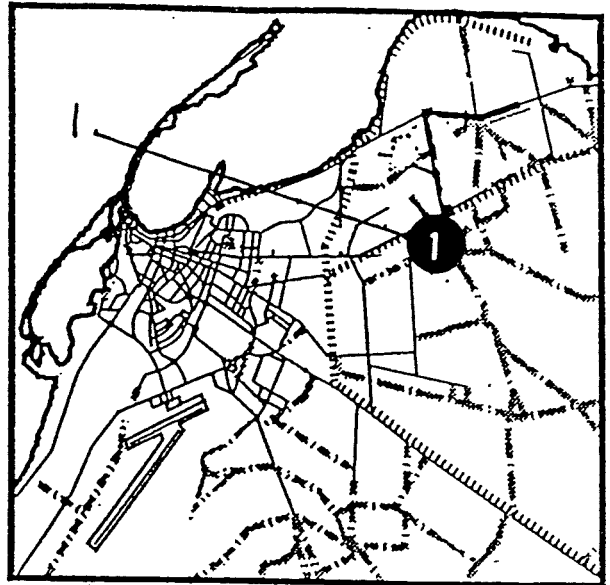

►Other private health centres operate nearby, but none were providing vaccinations or pre-natal care.

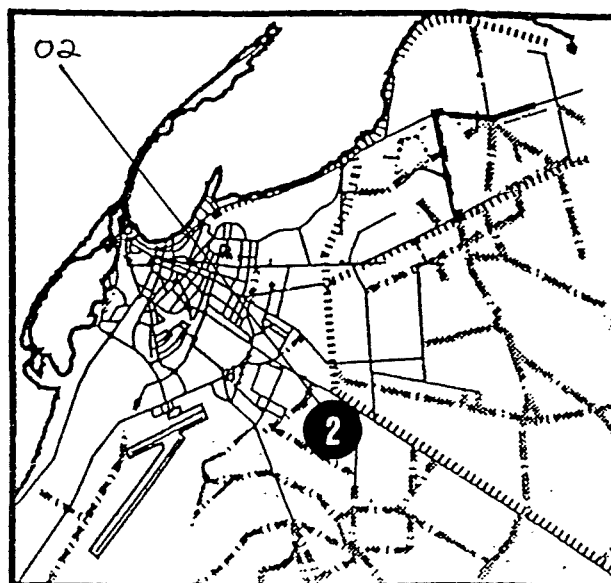

- ▶Recommended that D.W. only support this project as long as they are supplying materials. A system of food distribution for stages of work should be implemented.

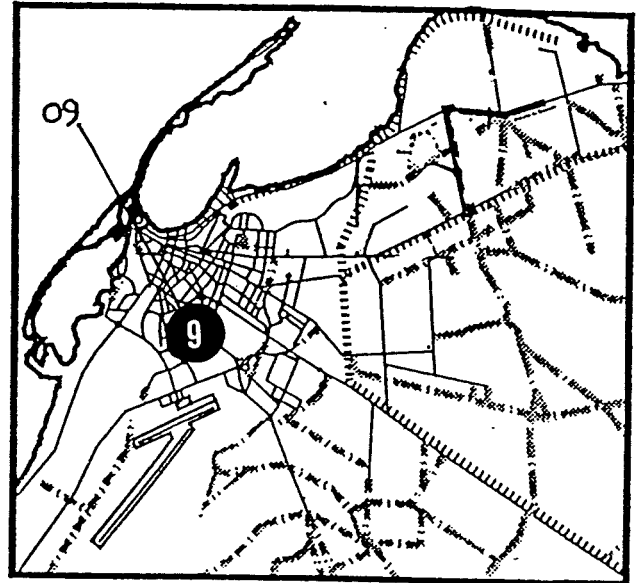

- ▶ Seventy-four students were said to be registered, but there was no formal register to verify this figure.
- ▶ Students are charged 10 million nKZ for a 4 month term.

Comments/ Comentarios:

- ▶ The centre had no filing or registration system that could be found. When asked how many students were currently enrolled, the administrator estimated the number of each class.
- ▶ Upon cross checking various sets of information, many of the answers were confusing and vague.
- ▶ The school was quite disorganized.
- ▶ Recommended that support be discontinued based primarily on the fact that it does not fall within DW's FFW objectives.

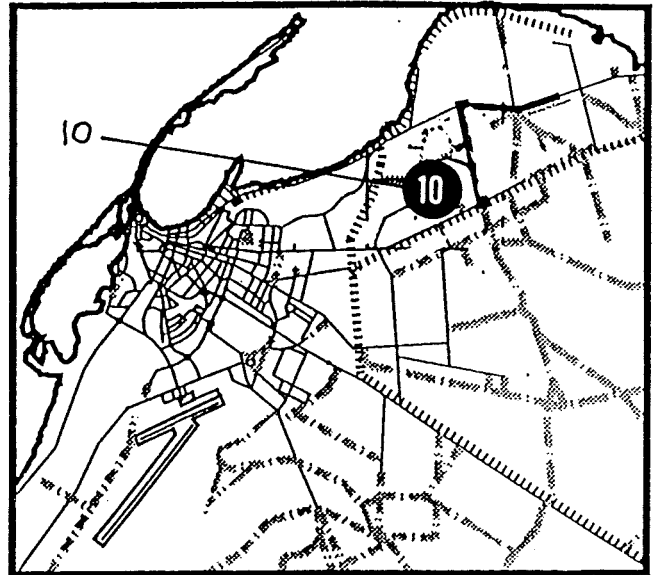

- ▶The school has 250 students currently registered whom are all registered.

Comments/ Comentarios:

- ▶Upon receiving contrary information from a student regarding fees, the directors were approached a second time and it was discovered that the school does charge a fee for books. Talking to 2 staff revealed discrepancies in the amounts and when it was paid.
- ▶The school director claimed that there were typing and language classes. The typing teacher taught 1 student/hour because there was only 1 typewriter (which was also used by the school's secretary). There was no evidence of the existence of either class; neither from our visits or from information from the assistant director.
- ▶Recommended that the project receives 8 f.t.rations and 3 p.t.rations for the 3 afternoon teachers.

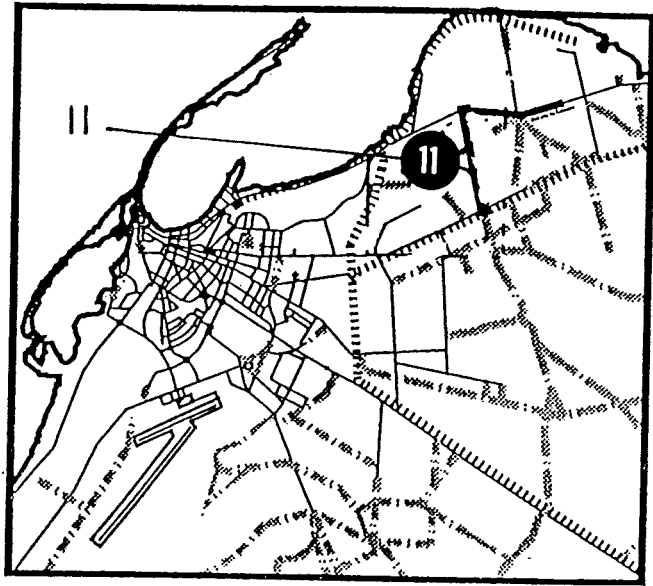

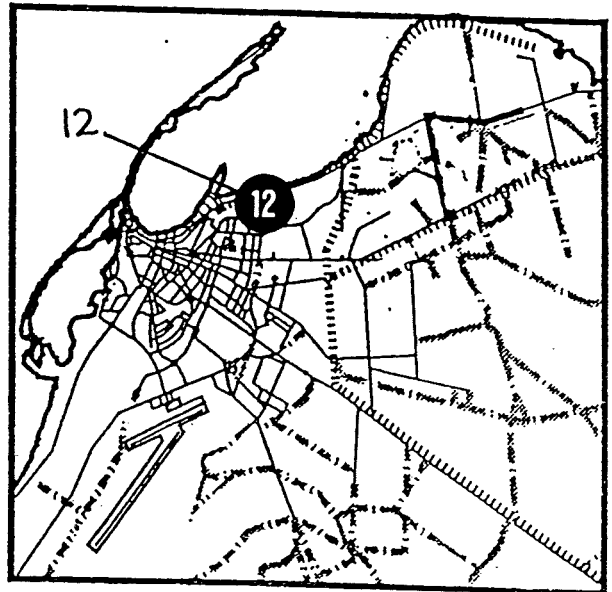

 ▶ The two stonemasons receive half rations only.

- ▶ Based on the fact that D.W. food is being used for the feeding centre, which is outside the mandate of D.W.'s ffw programme, food should be discontinued.

- ▶ Based on the low number of patients the centre sees, and due to the fact that there is another private health centre within 500 meters, it appears that there is not a great need for the centre.
- ▶ It is recommended that support for the health centre is discontinued.

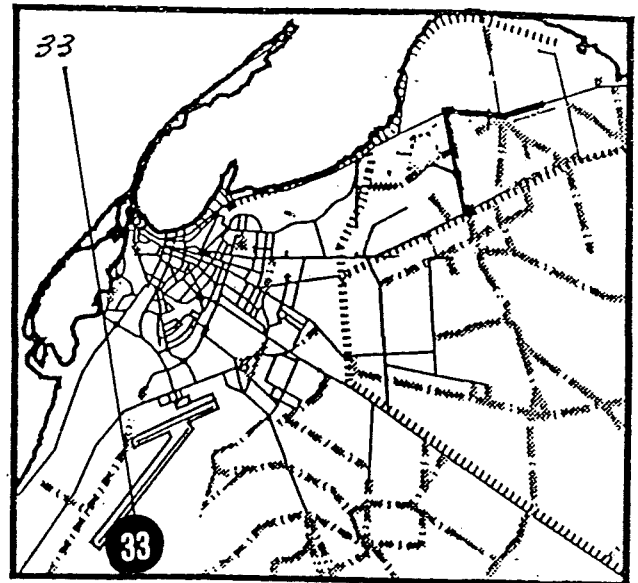

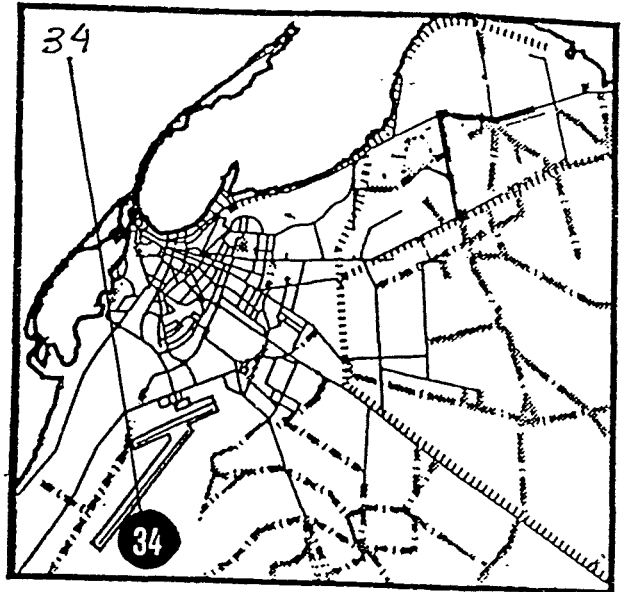

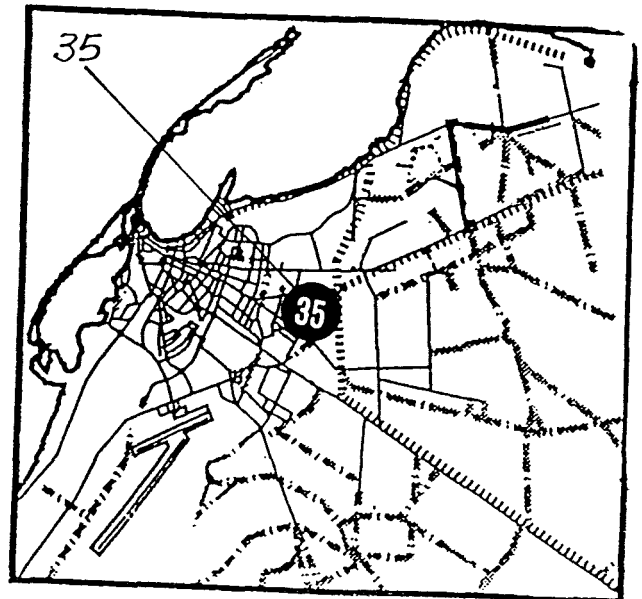

- ▶ The students pay a registration fee of 3 million nKZ for each course and then a monthly fee for sewing and a full fee for the typing course.

Comments/ Comentarios:

- ▶ The school did not have any registration statistics for any of the courses but they did have a list of students who finished the typing course in February. The school was lacking all statistics from 1994.
- ▶ The school has the basic materials to train students but the administration lacks organization.
- ▶ Recommended that the extra typing teacher's ration be cut because he/she is only used as a substitute.
- ▶ The project has potential, but is lacking organization. A request for specific monthly statistics has been made and it is recommended that the project coordinator provide some input to assist the project.
- ▶ Project advisor should visit within 3 months and make an assessment after 6 months.

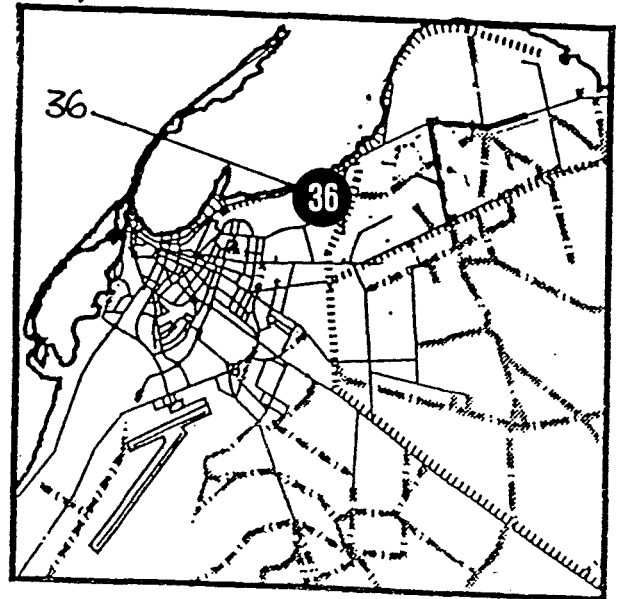

- ▶ The centre claims to have 2 sports coordinators but there was no evidence of their activities.
- ▶ Recommended that food be suspended for the construction until they begin building and for the sports teachers.
- ▶ The centre was informed that D.W. food cannot be used for any other purpose other than for the workers.

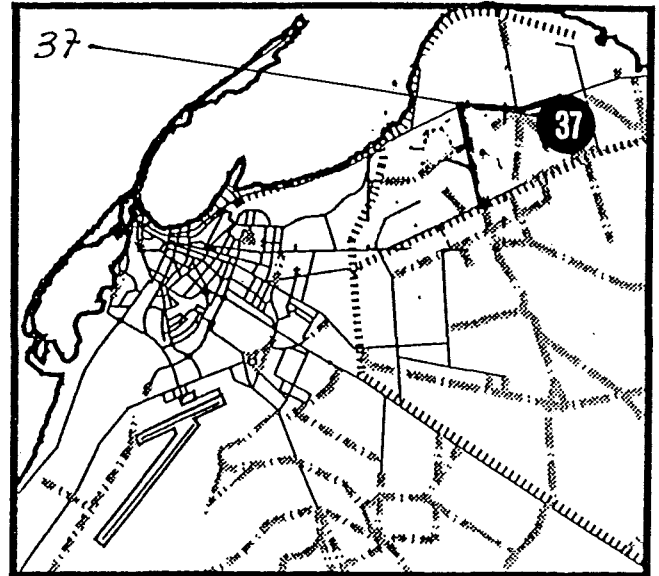

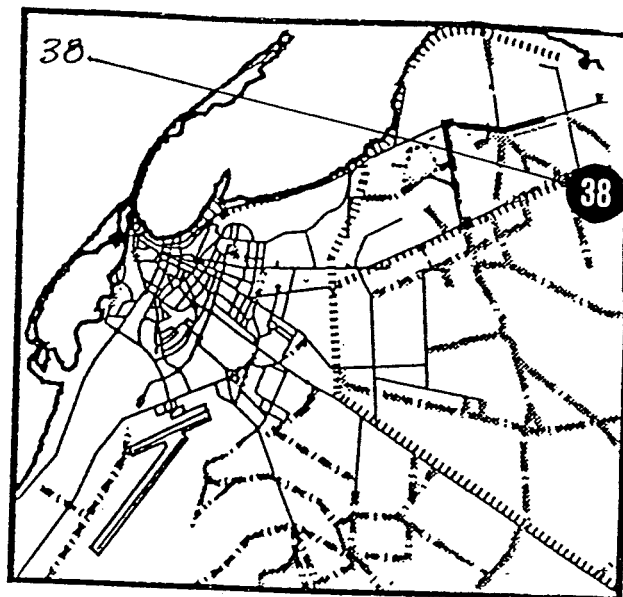

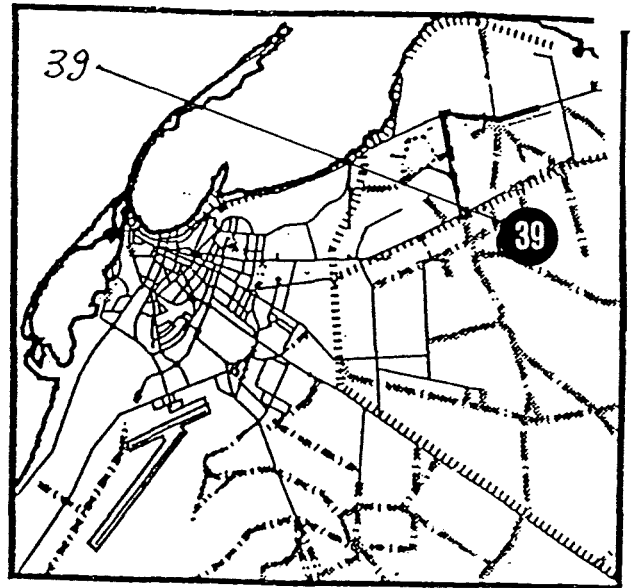

- ▶ ACM is building on an addition (for vaccinations and pre-natal care), but it is not know how it will finance the running costs.
- ▶ The fact that none of the medical staff have received formal training, the director is only a nurse basic training, the low number of patient to staff ration, and the lack of cleanliness of the centre is the basis for discontinuing food.

- ▶The area usually has a high incidence of diarrhoea related illnesses. The number of cases was not as high as previous years and one cause may be due to the chlorination.
- ▶The network is able to function as a group despite being virtually isolated from one another.
- ▶Recommended that D.W. continue to support the group.
